1. What should a first-time kitten owner know?

Always have food, water, and grooming essentials like brushes, litter and litter tray ready. Keep small items like rubber bands, marbles, bottle caps, etc out of your cat's reach as they may choke on these items. Be prepared for health emergencies.

Give your fur baby at least three days to adjust to their new home. Some may take longer, but as long as your new kitty is eating, drinking, and using the litter box, there's no need to worry.

13. What items do you need for a new cat?

You should get a cat cradle or carrier, food, bed, water and food bowls, cat litter and a litter box. You should also get cat hammocks, safe toys, grooming tools like brushes and nail trimmers and a collar with an ID tag.
